On Determining Amount and Conditions of Compulsory Civil Liability Insurance of a Private Bailiff

In accordance with the sub-paragraph "h" of the paragraph 12 of Article 113 of the 'Law of Georgia on Enforcement Proceedings', I order:

1. Within 5 days after issuing the license on enforcement activities by the legal entity of public law under the Ministry of Justice of Georgia –National Bureau of Enforcement a private bailiff submits a document certifying compulsory civil liability insurance to the National Bureau of Enforcement.

2. The following conditions are defined for the compulsory civil liability insurance of a private bailiff:
 - a) The object of the compulsory liability insurance of a private bailiff is the civil liability for causing damages while performing the functions of a private bailiff;
 - b) The compulsory civil liability insurance of a private bailiff is drawn by concluding an insurance agreement with the insurer. An insurer may be an insurance company registered in Georgia.
 - c) An unlawful act of a private bailiff, his assistant or any other employee during the insurance operation period that became the basis for causing damages, shall be deemed as an insurance case.
 - d) An insurer compensates the damages caused while fulfilling the functions of a private bailiff by paying the insurance reimbursement. In case the amount paid by the insurer is not enough to fully cover the caused damages, a bailiff covers the difference between the insurance reimbursement and actual amount of the damage.
3. The minimum amount of a private bailiff's civil liability insurance shall be defined as of 100 000 GEL per year.
